2013 City Schools Sustainability Challenge Report Form

"Recycling, Art, and the Environment"



Background Information:

Paper is so plentiful in the United States. We use paper in every classroom every single day. That makes it is easy to forget that making paper consumes trees and energy. In our school alone, we use an average of 10 sheets of paper per student per day. That sums up to 4,200 sheets of paper for 420 student population in one day or 756,000 sheets in one school year.

On estimate, 1 tree makes 16.67 reams of copy paper or 8,333.3 sheets (conervatree.org). Consuming 756,000 sheets; means killing 91 trees in one year. In addition, paper mills use a considerable amount of energy and at the same time contributes to the ever-growing pollution problem while producing these sheets of paper.

By recycling, we can help reduce the need for new paper and the industry's toxic emissions. Rather than discarding used writing paper or construction paper scraps, we can recycle them into useful paper products. Paper recycling saves trees, saves energy and reduces the production of pollutants from the paper mills.

At Augusta Fells Savage Institute of Visual Arts, we spearheaded the recycling project to help reduce our waste paper. Our goal is to recycle our used paper into something that is useful and use our products to send an eco-friendly message.

The Result:

The "Green Team" at Augusta Fells Savage Institute of Visual Arts believes in the power of arts and recycling to help save the environment. We collected used paper from our classrooms; we used our creativity and artistic abilities to turn them into useful products. By following a traditional method we have produced cards and bookmarks, we then used our artists to design the cards and bookmarks. Through the art of recycling, we take our part to help save the environment.

Our project helped turn waste paper into useable forms (greeting cards and bookmarks). In April and May alone, we have produced a total of 238 cards and 70 bookmarks. We have estimated that a card is made up of 4 sheets of paper and a bookmark by 2 sheets of paper. By calculation, we have recycled a total of (238 cardsx4= 928) (70bookmarksx2=140) 1,068 sheets of paper for the months of April and May.

The rest of the papers that we have collected were picked up by a staff from recycling center that comes every Thursday.

The materials that we have used in our project presentation during the "GreenScape" celebration at Polytechnic Institute were products of our recycling program. The cut out letters, the background papers, and the media of our artworks were 100% made from our recycled paper. Some of the cards were also used by students who participated in a three-day field to the Fox Island Environmental Study Center during their "Green Time". Others were designed and given away as greeting cards.

Part of our project is to educate students about their environment. The day-long field trips to the Phillip Merrill Environmental Science Center and the three-day field trip to the Fox Island helped students understand their part in keeping the Bay free from pollutants. These field experiences taught our students to live an eco-friendly living. They have also explored how the Philipp Merrill Environmental Center, a green building operates.








Three-day field study at the Fox Island Environmental Study Center, VA Chesapeake Bay.



















Partnerships:

The "Green Team" at Augusta Fells Savage Institute of Visual Arts have partnered with the Art Club after school program. The art club taught the team stenciling technique which they will use in printing the art works on their bookmark and greeting cards. The art club also helped the green team in designing their paper products.

The Chesapeake Bay Foundation has also helped us in accomplishing the environmental education part of our project. In this activity, the field trip participants were given the opportunity to have firsthand information about the Bay. They were also given an island immersion in which they had experienced to live and operate in a green building and at the same time gain understanding of the ecological and economic importance of the Bay.

The Blue Water Baltimore gave our students opportunity to plant trees around the Harlem Park Complex where our school is situated.

High Point of the Project:

The high point of our project was when the students produced their first products. At first they are hesitant to claim that it is possible for them to make the cards from used paper. There was a feeling of satisfaction, joy, and pride after they have finished their display boards from their finished products. To see their works on display was a joy to them. It was also a high point when their art teacher came and taught them how to stencil. Their teachers were at awe to see their finished products. Having the value of their hard work being recognized and praised by teachers is something that boasts their self-confidence.

Benefits of the Project to the Schools

If the project will continuously run as planned, we would be able to supply the paper materials for the art club and art classes. Also, with the project we would be able to develop a culture of recycling to make our school greener and to enlighten young students on why it is important to recycle and how we can keep our earth safe and healthier home to live in.

Interdisciplinary Connections:

<u>Biology:</u> Paper comes from trees; lesson on macromolecules – the paper is made from cellulose, a type of polysaccharide.

<u>Math:</u> Estimation and calculation of how many sheets of paper have been recycled. Determining the correct ratio/proportion of water and paper as well other inclusions like spices, glitter, and dried flowers. This is necessary to obtain the desired texture and thickness.

Art: Stenciling technique. Designing of the cards and the bookmarks requires artistic and aesthetic skills.

<u>Environmental Education</u>: Recycling is a method that can help reduce the world's need for new paper and the industry's toxic emissions. It saves trees, energy, and reduces pollution.

<u>Chemistry:</u> Understanding the chemical composition of commercial paper and looking for possible inclusion that would chemically blend with cellulose.

Next Step/What to Change in the Implementation Process:

Implement the project earlier to recycle more. Advertise the project more to attract more members by spreading the word through flyers, posters, and announcements. Have the products displayed in the school's art gallery and have a display in the school-wide "Artscape" as well.

Design the cards based on the season to make it timely and saleable.

Have the team conduct a demonstration of the paper-making process to educate the student-body about the importance and joy of recycling.

Advocate other ways to reduce paper-consumption in the school. This would include, encouraging teachers to print double-sided, reuse paper, online communication, etc.

Expand our project by recycling other waste products like plastics and tin cans.

Grant Award Suggestion:

I think that it would be better if the grant money could be given directly to teacher or department chair. The money being deposited to school account somehow limits the team to spend it on something that is very important to the implementation of the project. Reimbursement and request of the money could become a struggle as you will go through a long process of the business manager. I am not sure if it safe and acceptable to have the team open an account where the money can be deposited.

I think it would be helpful if the application and awarding of the grant be done a little earlier. In this way, implementation of the project especially those who are just starting their project for the first time can be done in the earliest time. Results/products may take a longer time for some projects.

Number of Students Involved/Reached:

The Green Team is composed of 5 active members but there were a number of senior students who assisted in the collection of the recycling boxes and in paper-making activity. Four student-artists helped in the design of our cards and bookmarks. 40 students participated in the two day-long field trips to the Chesapeake Bay and 12 students participated in the three-day island experience at the Fox Island. 23 students helped in the tree-planting activity and 24 students received an Energy Conservation educational talk from our guest speaker.

Our desire to become a Maryland Green School:

Augusta Fells Savage Institute of Visual Arts is not yet a Green School but the green team has the desire to make Augusta Fells one. AFSIVA is planning to apply in the next application season. Our green team has participated in a number of environmental projects, programs, and activities in and out of the school. Some of the environmental activities include tree-planting with Blue Water Baltimore, day-long and 3-day field experiences with the Chesapeake Bay, attended an international sea-turtle symposium. The school has also offered an environmental science class this summer. The green team is also planning to extend and improve environmental education and partnerships this coming school year. We will make this initiative more of a school-wide project in which teachers and students will work together to make our school a green school.

Baltimore Energy Challenge in spring 2013

Although we did not participate in the energy challenge this year, we have invited somebody to teach a class about energy conservation.

Questions, Comments, Concerns, Requests:

- I know that the students are genuine in their quest to help save the environment and to have an impact to their
 respective schools. Can the students who participated in the project get an individual recognition in a form of certificate or
 plaque or anything that they can be proud of? They have worked so hard and sacrificed to stay after school to fulfill their
 projects. I think that it is just to have these individuals get recognized.
- 2. We plan to re-apply for the grant next school year to sustain and extend our project. Is it fine to keep the same project in our grant application? We are planning to increase the number of recycle bins and our production of cards and bookmarks with the addition of some more paper-made novelty items. We will recruit more members so we can recycle more.
- The 1,000 dollar grant aided us a lot in our project and was certainly beneficial to inform students on how to protect and take care of the environment.
